**CHINA MINING TUESDAY 21 OCTOBER, 2014.**

1. Meeting with Chinese Officials.

Before the CRIRSCO presentation at the China Mining 2014 Conference, a meeting took place with representatives of CRIRSCO, the Ministry of Lands and Resources (MOLAR) and the China Mining Association (CMA). The panel was comprised of Edmundo Tulcanaza, Chairperson of CRIRSCO, Mr Xu Da Chun, now Director General of Reserves Administration of MOLAR, Mr Wang Jia Hua, Chairman of CMA, and Mr Chen Xian Da, Executive Vice Chairman of CMA.

Following introductory comments from the organisations, Mr Xu outlined the history of the development of reporting codes in China. While China has developed its own internal standards, they have taken note of International Standards, starting with UNFC 1997. Since 2006, discussions have taken place with JORC and representatives of similar codes. They have also noted the changes in Russia with the introduction of the NAEN Code, in parallel with the State standard. He was pleased to see contact with CRIRSCO being maintained and looked forward to enhanced communication and cooperation. Contact should be maintained through CMA and the Mineral Resource Valuation Centre.

Mr Tulcanaza assured him that CRIRSCO would maintain contact as suggested and looked forward to China's joining CRIRSCO in the future.

2. Presentations

The opening address was from Mr Edmundo Tulcanaza, President of CRIRSCO, on the Role of CRIRSCO. He was followed by Ms Deborah McCombe, Past President of CRIRSCO, on Membership of CRIRSCO. The next speaker was Mr Peter Stoker, representative of JORC on CRIRSCO, who explained

The final presentation was by Mr Stoker, who expressed his gratitude to the many people who were involved in the translation. He then made the official launch of the Chinese translation of JORC 2012.
